If your home is in the path of a hurricane or even a tropical storm or nor'easter – which can be just as damaging – would you be prepared?

Severe storms usually do not strike our Sregion, but some have come close. Since record keeping began in 1886, the only hurricane to make direct landfall in New Jersey occurred on September 16, 1903 and it sustained winds were only 3 miles per hour more than the 74 mph minimum to be classified as a hurricane.

Historically most hurricanes have veered away from New Jersey. The state is surrounded by deep water that is below 80 degrees Fahrenheit which limits the intensity of a hurricane, it has a westerly air stream which tends to push approaching hurricanes out to sea and its 123-mile coastline is aligned on a north-south axis which makes it less vulnerable to northeasterly hurricanes.

PREPARATION TIPS:

- Check batteries for radios and flashlights
- Secure loose rain gutters and downspouts

- Check supplies of special medicines and drugs
- Learn the location of official shelters (Henry Hudson Regional School)
- Learn safe routes inland

FOOD SAFETY DURING A DISASTER

Keep the fridge closed. When power is lost, avoid opening the refrigerator and freezer. When doors remain closed, food tempertures will remain within safe ranges for 4 hours if refrigerated and 48 hours if frozen. Any perishable foods that are not kept at 40 degrees Fahreneheit should be discarded.

- Cook or boil. As always, all food should be cooked to proper temperatures to avoid potential food-borne illnesses.
- Wash with clean water. If an item requires washing before eating, make sure that the water used to wash it is not contaminated prior to use.
- Use prepared formulas. For infants, efforts should be made to avoid preparing formula unless bottled water is available or you are certain the water supply is not contaminated. Your best bet is to use prepared, ready-to-use formula.
- Stick to waterproof containers. If flooding has occurred, discard foods that are not in waterproof containers.
- Undamaged, commercially canned foods can be salvaged, but labels should be removed and the outside of the cans carefully disinfected prior to use. Remember to re-label cans with a description of the contents and expiration dates.
- If in doubt, throw it out. If containers with twist tops or snap lids (even bottled or canned sodas) have been exposed to contaminated waters, discard them immediately. There is no assurance that they can be adequately disinfected to allow use.
- Avoid wood or plastics. Porous items such as wood cutting boards and plastic utensils exposed to flood waters should be discarded. There is no way to ensure that these items can be adequately disinfected prior to use.



Voter registration Deadline is October 16, 2007 - 21 days prior to election day.

To register in New Jersey you must be:

- ✓ a United States citizen, at least 18 years old by the next election;
- ✓ a resident of the county for 30 days before the election.

How to Register:

Mail or deliver the Voter Registration Application to the County Commissioner of Registration or Superintendent of Elections.

Where to Register:

Applications for registration can be obtained from the Division of Elections, the Commissioners of Registration office, or from your Municipal Clerk. Registration forms are also available at Division of Motor Vehicle offices.

Voting Options:

Vote in person at your designated polling place.

Vote using an Absentee Ballot [In New Jersey, you do not need a reason].

A voter may apply for an absentee ballot by completing an Absentee Ballot Application and mailing the application to their County Clerk up to 7 days prior to the election. A voter may also apply in person to the County Clerk until 3:00 p.m., the day before the election.

Now there is "no excuse" not to vote!

Where to Vote: Polls are open from 6:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m.

Districts 1 and 4 vote at the Senior Center in the Municipal Harbor.

Districts 2 and 3 vote at the Fireman's Field House on the corner of Avenue C and W. Washington Ave.

n-Line skating and skate boarding have become such a popular passtime for many children and young adults that providing a safe environment for this sport would fill a great need for the Borough.

local streets may cause automobile and pedestrian accidents.

It has been the Borough's intention to provide a safe haven, recreational facility to prevent these accidents for many years, but has always been faced with the obstacles of where to put the facility and the cost of constructing and operating it.

The Mayor, Council and Harbor Commission have agreed to continue developing the Municipal Harbor by providing a modern skate park in a safe environment.

The proposed skate park would be an addition to the existing Har-

bor facilities, which include basketball, park. This location has easy access from First Avenue, would be easily accessed by those desiring to use the facility, but would not be a distur-

bance to the peaceful nature of Atlantic Highlands.

The proposed park design not only provides the amenities associated with the skating facility. it includes improvements to the existing landscaping as well as the street aesthetics by providing additional landscaping.

The Borough has pursued a number of State and County funded grant programs in order to provide more recre-

ational areas and improve the quality of its existing facilities. The Monmouth County Open Space Grant Program has awarded the Borough a grant in the amount of \$50,000 for the completion of this project. Associated costs to maintain this type of facility should be similar, if not less than the costs associated with the existing playground.

Great New Spots For Hikers

ake a walk to see three new bright spots created by volunteers - the lifeblood of environmental projects in town:

- As from 1892, Hilton Station was a stop on the railroad that ran from the steamboat pier at the foot of First Avenue along the bay to Highlands and beyond. Summer people going to Camp Hilton tents disembarked there, between today's 22 and 26 Bayside Drive. Long overgrown and inaccessible, the hilltop and 36 concrete steps at this historic site have now been cleared by Eagle Scout candidate Ted Callis and friends. Another project is needed to enclose a downhill drainage channel that crosses the rest of the path to the bay edge, providing an entry point to the proposed Bayshore Trail.
- The 2.4 acre Campo Overlook section of Lenape Woods East is now open for hikers, because of a project by Eagle Scout candidate John Archibald and friends. They blazed, bordered and mulched new trails circling the Overlook and connecting with existing ones, installed trail signs and fencing, and filled in illegal bike ramps that had been dug there. At an opening ceremony, a ribbon was cut by Mayor Pete Donoghue, scout Archibald, and the previous landowner Maria Campo,

who helped preserve this high woodland plateau with views in three directions.

■ The Native Plant Garden at the entry to Lenape Woods on East Highland Avenue is thriving. Created by Shirley Carhart and Bill Thorne with help from other Environmental Commission volunteers, it features shrubs and perennials that are indigenous and acclimatized to our area and therefore need no 4 extra watering, fertilizer or pesticides.
